**STATUS OF REALIGNMENT**

Napa County is one of the top ten counties using split sentencing. Thirty-nine people have been given a split sentence in Napa. Twenty-five of those have been released and supervised by probation, four have expired, two have been transferred to another jurisdiction, and two are in warrant status. Napa is currently supervising 77 PRCS cases. Three more have successfully completed PRCS at the one year mark. We are still using flash incarcerations when needed and have not had to revoke many PRCS cases. The Court has been seeing more 1170(h) sentences with significant jail time. Judge Tisher is now overseeing Department E and will begin attending these meetings in place of Judge Boessenecker. Preparation is under way for July when the Court takes over parole hearings. Currently, the jail sees approximately 3-6 parole holds per week. Lenard share a more precise number of parole holds at the next meeting.

**JAIL POPULATION UPDATE**

The jail's population is at 262 today. Eleven people are expected to remand tomorrow, however, the jail is attempting to contact and reschedule remand dates for some. They are seeing more serious and sophisticated criminals within the population. Of 68 people in programming, only four have failed.

Probation's on-call program will begin by the end of January. It was put on hold due to the holidays.

**LEGISLATIVE PLATFORM**

The Board is considering a 2042 Platform. There will be a meeting next Tuesday addressing concerns about Napa State Hospital residents in jail and other issues.

### **STAFF SECURE RESIDENTIAL FACILITY**

The Alternative Sanctions Committee continues to look into a 50-bed re-entry facility for jail inmates to transition back into the community with appropriate programming and services. Appropriate candidates will be assessed by the jail and probation and will serve a minimum of 90 days in the program. Sex or Violent offenders will not be considered. It will cost approximately ½ million dollars to renovate the building and approximately 1 million dollars to operate. Rent of the building from the State needs to be considered in operation costs. It will be proposed the facility be run by Probation staff. Services and programs will be held at the facility as well as referred out. It would be beneficial if a GED or Adult School program could be run at the facility.

### **NEW JAIL UPDATE**

The EIR process will begin at the end of the month and a notice of publication will be released for the out-of-downtown site. It is hoped there will be something to present to Planning/CEO by the end of this calendar year.
