APPROVAL OF November 16, 2015 MINUTES

JAIL POPULATION REPORT

The current jail population is 272, which includes Solano County housed inmates. Female population also up. Another 4024 was filed today due to the jail crowding needs. There is a lot of work going on at the jail on the third floor. There are work crews working from 6 a.m. - 10 p.m. Next week they will be working on the exterior of the building. Work is moving steadily and hopefully once work is done we can start moving inmates back.

DOSAGE PROBATION

Probation Committee is moving ahead and meeting every week. Had a little bit of a hold up as some of the officer's attached to this program have been away at their five week CORE training, but will be back next week. Mark Carey and Mimi Carter will be out the end of this month to give us our on-site training to get everyone up and ready to go. We're hoping shortly thereafter we will be able to start including this into our orientation and be able to start talking to about taking advantage of programming sooner rather than later in their terms of probation so that if they complete what we ask them to complete they can get off of probation early. No exact start date yet, but we are thinking in April.

From the courts perspective, you will start seeing an order coming in fairly soon in the Court reports. Order should be similar to that of the Day Reporting Center.

REALIGNMENT TRAINING MONEY FOR CIT AND JUSTICE CENTER TRAININGS

This is money that the governor put in the budget as a one-time but has now continuously put it in the budget. We were told we would only get money if we completed the survey. It has been completed and submitted on time, we will be receiving \$100,000. We have two ideas on how money could be spent. On idea is to have classes to have all law enforcement trained in CIT. The other idea is to fund training up in April, for those who are interested in attending, for the Family Justice Center. Family Justice Center is a one stop shop for victims of violence. The Annual conference will be held in San Diego, April 12-14. If you are interested in attending let Mary know.

TRANSITIONAL YOUTH DIVERSION PROGRAM

The Chief Probation Officer's came up with an idea to look at the 18-21 year olds we work with and in looking at that crimes continue to go down and we all seem to have extra juvenile hall space, we came up with the idea of possibly starting a "Transitional Youth Diversion Program." The idea of this program is to have 18-21 year-old non-violent offenders who are new to the system and would otherwise be housed at the jail would serve their time in juvenile hall. They would be receiving programming in the units separate from the juvenile. Napa County will be part of pilot program if it goes anywhere.

LAURA'S LAW

Laura's Law is an involuntary treatment that was first established in Napa County. It does not involve medication, but it does involve case management services, court appearances, and support for people we see go through the jail and fall apart because there is not someone looking out for them. There has been several meetings with mental health to see if this is something worth exploring, it has been agreed it was. Unfortunately, case management services require additional personnel. We are looking at ways to initiate this program. It will be brought to the CCP committee to see if funding from realignment can be used.

STATUS OF REALIGNMENT FROM PARTNERS

Public Defender was able to find funding for part-time social worker who will be dealing primarily with mental health folks. They will be placed at the public defender's office.

Law enforcement has Annual Legislative Day on April 12 and 13th, in Sacramento. This year will cover realignment.

COMMUNITY RECIDIVISM REDUCTION GRANT DATA REPORT

Report submitted on time letting them know if we spent the money. For our first year we received \$50,000 as our annual amount. The second year it dropped to \$25,000. First year's money (\$10,000 each) was submitted to BI which was used to provide training to a number of our domestic violence providers; Boys and Girls Club to provide free memberships to the siblings of youth on probation or to the children of the parents who are on probation; On the Move who work with the youth who are eligible for the Independent Living Program (up to the age of 24) and are either in juvenile hall or in jail to get them better resources when they are out of custody; Puertas Abiertas who supports the Legacy program has served 23 youth and helped them do their field trip to Los Angeles to see Homeboy Industries; S.T.E.P. to help out the youth at Chamberlain, they have since returned the money as the woman running the program passed away.
