Lake Berryessa Watershed Grants Available

\$600,000 in grant funds is available!

The Napa County Flood Protection and Watershed Improvement Authority announces a multi-year Lake Berryessa watershed project funding program and is seeking applications. Submittal deadline is Dec. 30, 2016.

Eligible projects must be capable of offering one or more watershed

improvement benefit(s) to Lake Berryessa and/or tributaries within the Putah Creek / Suisun Creek watershed including:

- *Agricultural watershed improvements*
- *Stormwater runoff management*
- *Invasive species control (agriculture and stormwater betterments)*
- *Natural wetland buffer creation*

- *Water quality restoration*
- *Watershed protection activities*

See the Light & Save \$

Public Works is coordinating with PG&E to swap out the old, often times burned out and inefficient HPS (High Pressure Sodium) street lights in the Napa County unincorporated area.

The new lights use energy efficient LED (Light emitting diode) fixtures. The old HPS lights have a yellowish glow, and the new LED lights have a blueish glow that has been mistaken for a full moon.

A total of 379 lights are being replaced, with 80% of the cost funded through a PG&E energy efficiency program.

The remaining 20% is being paid by the Roads budget and by CSA 3.

It is anticipated that the county will save over \$4,000 per year in energy costs and the lights have a 10 year warranty. The total replacement program is anticipated to be wrapped up by the end of January.

Re-Entry Facility Design Complete

Design for Napa County's new Re-Entry Facility has been completed and the project will now go out for bids pending State of California approvals. Start of construction is scheduled for the Spring of 2017 and construction completion for the Spring of 2018 with occupancy by the Fall of 2018. The estimated project cost is \$17.4 Million for the Re-entry Facility.

Approximately \$14 Million in funding comes from State of California State Bill (SB) 1022 lease revenue bond funds with the remaining funded by the County.

The project includes the installation of off-site utilities to serve the Re-Entry Facility as well as the future new Jail, at an estimated cost of \$4.3 Million.

The 21,000 square feet Re-Entry Facility will be built at the County property located at 2300 Napa Vallejo

Highway, just south of Napa State Hospital. The re-entry facility will serve as a step-down facility between the traditional methods of incarceration and subsequent release from custody.

The building will provide housing, program, and administrative space. People assigned to serve the latter part of their sentence in this location will be required to go through programs that are intended to reduce recidivism while providing them with opportunities to find education, housing, and employment.

The housing area will include four housing units providing approximately 72 beds; day rooms; recreation yard; and food service, maintenance, storage, and control space. The building will also include program/visitation rooms, counseling rooms, and administrative and kitchen/dining space.

Carithers Roof Has a New Coat

Not a moment too soon before winter, the Carithers Reroof Project is complete. The contractor, Central Bay Roofing and Restoration, finished the work in November.

The start of the project had a set-back this summer, with the discovery that a full tear-off of the old roof would be required to meet building code, costing far more than the approved budget could support.

Through suggestions for alternate methods, however, the roof was successfully upgraded with a silicone coating over top of the existing surface, without the

need to for full demolition. A partial demolition to provide a sound coating surface, however, revealed moisture in the roof (see photo below).



Given the unknowns for the project, the budget accommodated the alternate coating method, as well as some contingency for unknown conditions. The work was completed under budget. Put your sunglasses on when you take a look!
