Be the Solution to Stormwater Pollution!

Only Rain Down the Drain

In Napa County, all storm drains (the
lines in streets) flow directly to creeks or
other waterways with no treatment!



In response to federal and state
regulations and requirements, the
municipalities in Napa County have joined
to form the

Napa Countywide Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program (NCSPPP)

In addition to reviewing their own
practices that may harm water quality, the
NCSPPP agencies have launched
a public education campaign and
inspection programs to raise public
awareness about stormwater pollution
and to reduce the amount of pollutants
discharged from residential and
commercial sources.

Doing Your Part

Your swimming
pool, spa, or hot tub
maintenance practices
can make a significant
difference in the water
quality of our creeks,
the Napa River, and
the San Francisco Bay.

Many chemicals used in pool
maintenance,
e.g., chlorine,
bromine,
copper, all are
extremely toxic to
aquatic life.

For example, the State Department of Fish
and Game has determined that levels of
chlorine in water higher than 0.01 parts
per million (ppm) are dangerous to the
ecosystems. The typical chlorine level
maintained in a pool is 1-4 ppm, that is
100-400 times the harmful level.

By doing a few simple things you can protect
the fish and ecosystems that live in our creeks
and comply with local, state, and federal
regulations.

Remember that you are also responsible for
the actions of your contractors. Be sure you
know how your contractor will be disposing
of the pool, spa, or hot tub water and the
filter during stormwater and debris work.
